CARRYING THE WEIGHT

An elephant never forgets. A phrase that many of us have probably heard, but has quite a unique beginning. The origin of the phrase seems to go back to observations that elephants follow the same paths and even hand down genetic memories of directions and places across generations. Each elephant herd has a certain burial place, like many human communities, and always help the dying ones get back there, so long as there is no traumatic injury.

The most famous example of the persistent, and dangerous, memory of elephants is illustrated in the story "Elephant Walk," which was actually made into a movie in 1954. It was a true story of a British colonial tea plantation, called Elephant Walk Bungalow, which was built across a traditional elephant path in India. The elephants were confused and enraged to find their way blocked, and every year at the same time, the plantation's staff would have to defend their property and deflect the herds around it so they could get from one side of the offending villa back to their traditional migration.

Finally the elephants could not be deterred, and one year in rage they finally stormed through the plantation, destroying it and killing many of the people, restoring the traditional road. So, elephants certainly have good memories, and know how to hold a grudge, but they are not the only ones. For those who have been supposedly wronged or mistreated by someone, especially a friend or family member, they can have some of the longest memories of any creature alive. Grudges are easy to pick up and carry, but they are very difficult to lay aside and forget.

I have heard grudges compared to that of militaries in history. Armies would often carry cannonballs with them, just in case they might come across their enemy. They were heavy and burdensome, cost a lot, and required much sacrifice to haul. But the armies considered it worth the risk, because what if they came across their enemy and had nothing to shoot at them? Although they may not weigh the same physically, emotionally and spiritually grudges weigh the same as cannonballs. But it doesn't make much sense to carry them along with us as soldiers did in history. Mostly because the "enemy" is completely unaware of your anger and enmity toward them, and they would certainly be surprised to learn that you have been following them with a cannonball in your pocket. So, it is important to examine your grudges and do what the armies did in the past when the hostile times had ended. Unload the cannonballs and stack them on a courthouse lawn, then marvel at how much easier it was to get around.

Not only will it be easier on you if you lay aside any grudges or resentment, but if we want any blessings from

God, then we better think twice about picking up a grudge and carrying it along. We see a great example of this in the book of Job. When Satan had caused Job to lose everything that he had, we find Job sitting in ashes and covered in burlap. If there was anything that Job could have used at that time, it was the love and support of his friends and family. But that was quite the opposite of what he received. As a matter of fact, when they first came to Job, Job 2:13 says, "They sat with him on the ground seven days and seven nights, and no one spoke a word to him, for they saw that his suffering was very great." When they finally did speak, it was anything but comforting and reassuring. They began blaming and accusing Job of some egregious sins that he must have committed. At one point Job even says to his friends, "I have heard many such things; miserable comforters are you all." (Job 16:2) But that wasn't just Job's opinion about his friends. As a matter of fact, God became angry and rebuked Job's friends for how terrible they were. Job 42:7 says, "After the Lord had spoken these words to

Job, the Lord said to Eliphaz the Temanite: "My anger burns against you and against your two friends, for you have not spoken of me what is right, as my servant Job has."

However, although Job might have had every right to hold a grudge against his friends, we learn that Job was never blessed by God, and he never received any of what was lost from him until he prayed for his friends.

Job 42:10 tells us, "And the Lord restored the fortunes of Job, when he had prayed for his friends. And the Lord gave Job twice as much as he had before. What a powerful example of humility and compassion that must have took! And it is a great lesson we must all take to heart. If we want the mercy of God, we must extend mercy. Jesus says in Matthew 5:7, "Blessed are the merciful, for they shall receive mercy." Jesus also tells us in Matthew 6:14-15, "For if you forgive others their trespasses, your heavenly Father will also forgive you, but if you do not forgive others their trespasses, neither will your Father forgive your trespasses." If we want the forgiveness of God, we must extend forgiveness. because if we don't, holding that grudge can cost us big time! Not only will it cause us to carry unnecessary weight here on earth, but that weight can keep us out of God's eternal kingdom. Hebrews 12:1 tells us, "Therefore, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us also lay aside every weight, and sin which clings so closely, and let us run with endurance the race that is set before us,". What unnecessary weight are you carrying? Lay it aside and walk with Christ.
