SILENCE & MEDITATION

I will never forget my first day in my fundamentals of music class at Freed-Hardeman. Our teacher opened with John Cage's 1952 composition 4'33". If you have never heard it is a wonderful piece of music that consists of four minutes and thirty-three seconds of...complete silence. The orchestra sits in a ready position, the conductor stands before them and turns the pages of blank sheet music. Then it ends, everyone cheers, and the musicians all bow. I was so lost watching this video on my first day of music class. But then my teacher pointed to the wall at a quote from Mozart. The quote was "Music is not in the notes but in the silence between."

What a powerful lesson, but I think what made it so memorable to me was the awkwardness of silence in the class for so long. It comes as no surprise that most people do not like the quiet stillness of silence. I can remember when I was young and being home alone, I almost always needed background noise of some kind to even do my homework. Of course, there are times that we enjoy silence for a moment, but how long do you think you could go without talking or filling the empty space you are in with some kind of noise. There are so many things we do to keep from getting to that point where silence seems to overwhelm us. However, if we can get to the point of complete silence, it is in those moments we can begin to think on or meditate on things that the noise of everyday life does not allow us.

One of my favorite words in the Hebrew language demonstrates this very well. It is most often seen in the book of Psalms and is transliterated as Selah. Although this word is not fully understood, it is often translated as an instruction to pause, be still, or be silent. Although this word seems to be mostly used as a way for the nation of Israel to read music, it also introduces us to a powerful thought of how we are to meditate on God's word. Romans 10:17 tells us, "So faith comes from hearing, and hearing through the word of Christ." We know that if we read our Bibles and pray every day that we can grow...grow...grow. However, do we simply read it, or do we pause and meditate on God's word? Much too often we tend to read the Bible much like a textbook. We pack as much information as we can in our minds so that we can be able to recall it at a moment's notice. Sometimes we might read the Bible just to get through it. We power through Leviticus with hardly any understanding of what we just read, just to say we did it. Of course, the Bible includes many different types of literature, and they can be read in different ways, but have you ever thought about reading the Bible with more pauses?

Not the kind of pauses where you got distracted by what was on the tv or because someone came in the room, but purposeful and clear pauses. Moments set aside to be still, pause, or be silent. Notice what **Psalm** 4:4 tells us, "Be angry, and do not sin; ponder in your own hearts on your beds and be silent. Unfortunately, the aspect of meditation has become a lost practice when it comes to Bible study. Even the word meditation more likely brings up images of a monk in a monastery or a "free spirited" person living in the desert more than it brings up the image of a Christian diving into the living word of God. But consider what David wrote in Psalm 1:1-2 "Blessed is the man who walks not in the counsel of the wicked, nor stands in the way of sinners, nor sits in the seat of scoffers; but his delight is in the law of the Lord, and on his law, he meditates day and night."

I think one reason we often overlook meditating on God's word is because it simply takes up so much time. In our busy schedules, we struggle to find enough time to do the things we need to do...but when was the last time you struggled to make time for the things you wanted to do? Consider this, reading the Bible with meditation is no more than taking the time to think on the scriptures that are read. To think on how they apply to you, or how it fits with God's overall message. Meditating on God's word is taking, or making the time to pause, Selah, and not only read God's word but hear God speak to you. "Finally, brothers, whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is commendable, if there is any excellence, if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things." Philippians 4:8 **Andrew Spivey**
